### **BALANCE, JUGGLE & HOLD ON FOR DEAR LIFE**

Upon meeting a young female attorney or law student for the first time, I am almost always asked about how I manage working as a full-time litigator while being a mother. Like all other employed mothers, some days I balance, some days I juggle and other days I simply hold on for dear life. Recently, Oprah Winfrey held a spa getaway contest that I considered entering. Contestants were to send in a post-card stating in 50 words or less why the contestant deserved a spa getaway. As I pondered the reasons why I felt I needed a spa getaway, I created an alphabetical list of the various roles I play in my life as a woman. You might recognize yourself in some of these, and I imagine together we could brainstorm a list at least a mile long.

So how does one manage these and all our other various roles as professional women? While I am still learning as I go, I am convinced that making it work requires these three things—Support, Security and Sanity.

**SUPPORT—It really does take a village.**

I have always considered myself to be independent. One thing I have had to learn as a mommy-lawyer is to ask for help and to accept it when offered. There is no substitute for a good support network, made up of family members, a spouse or partner, friends, hired help, your secretary, paralegal, law firm or law partners, and anyone else who offers you a hand. Having someone to “pinch hit” for you in times of work crisis is essential to meeting your obligations to your clients and employer. I sometimes find that I need multiple layers of support, so that I am not always calling on the same person, and so that if one person is unavailable, another can step in to help. Do NOT try to be super-woman and do it all on your own. Let others do what they are best at, and you do what you are best at. Force yourself to ask for help, rather than waiting for others to help you *sua sponte*.

### **SECURITY—It frees up your focus.**

In order to be able to truly focus on the task at hand, you must be able to devote your mind to whatever you are engaging in. There is no such thing as multitasking when it comes to activities requiring thought. Each attempt to multitask results in a distraction from your original activity. If you can focus on one thing at a time, you will accomplish more and be less stressed. For me, focusing on my work must be prefaced by security in knowing my child is well cared and happy in my absence. There is no substitute for finding the right fit for your child, whether it is daycare, a nanny, family care, working from home, working while your child sleeps, working part time, or some combination of the above. I have personally found that having my child close to my office during the day, rather than close to my home, enables me to work a little later in the afternoons—a must in litigation, and it also offers me a sense of comfort in knowing he is close enough to drop in if I would like to. This element was especially important to me as I transitioned back to work following my maternity leave.

### **SANITY—It is easy to lose!**

Sometimes the stresses of being a lawyer alone are enough to drive a woman crazy. Add to that our other roles and responsibilities, and the stresses are more than overwhelming. To be a good lawyer, wife, mother, and whatever other roles you play, you absolutely have to carve out time for yourself. There is no substitute for taking time for yourself. In the precious little time you have at the end of the day, or in the early morning hours, take a little time to exercise, read, stretch, paint, pray, reflect, write, or whatever activity brings you relaxation and peace. Take a day off from work once in a while to spend alone or with a friend. Keeping “your” time sacred is not selfish, and you should not feel guilty about it. By refreshing yourself, you emerge ready to meet challenges with a good attitude and clarity of mind.

Finally, let us all provide sanity, security and support for our fellow sister lawyers. Too often, we miss opportunities to encourage and uplift one another. As you climb the corporate ladder or build your business, do not forget to value the unique perspective that a woman lawyer brings to the table. Enable other professional women to succeed by giving them permission to take time for themselves, helping them find secure child care and supporting at every opportunity.

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### **Nina Miglionico “Paving The Way” Award Recipient M. Ann Huckstep Honored by The Women Lawyers Section of the Birmingham Bar Association**

The Women Lawyers Section of the Birmingham Bar Association honored M. Ann Huckstep, chair of the Executive Committee of the law firm of Adams and Reese LLP, as the recipient of their prestigious Nina Miglionico "Paving The Way" Leadership Award. The ceremony took place on April 26, 2007 at the Concord Center in downtown Birmingham. According to Ashley H. Hattaway, Chair of the Women Lawyers Section, "The Nina Miglionico 'Paving The Way' Leadership Award was established by the Women Lawyers Section to recognize and honor lawyers who have actively paved the way to success and advancement for women lawyers. Our recipient this year, Ann Huckstep, has served as an inspiration to others and has paved the way for the advancement and status of other women lawyers." The "Paving The Way" Leadership Award, exemplifies Nina Miglionico's (Miss Nina) life and her devotion to the public good, as one of the state's first women lawyers to engage in private practice in 1936, and as an altruistic supporter of her church, community, and nation throughout her decades of service. Hattaway continues, "Ann exemplifies the purpose and meaning of the Nina Miglionico 'Paving the Way' Award. Despite devoting countless hours to her clients and her thriving legal practice, Ann is active in numerous civic and community groups and has held leadership roles in most of them." Chair-elect of the Women Lawyers Section, Leatha Gilbert, adds, "It is our intent that recipients of this award, like Ann, have achieved professional excellence, assisted women lawyers through mentoring, inspired women lawyers as a professional role model, and provided opportunities for the advancement of women lawyers." Huckstep joins last year's Nina Miglionico recipient, Judge Inge Prytz Johnson, in personifying the true meaning of "Paving The Way." Anthony A. Joseph, President of the Birmingham Bar Association notes, "Ann has excelled throughout her career due to hard work, determination, and dedication. Her profession has been marked by great accomplishments and numerous 'female firsts.' Her passion for the practice of law and her community activism serves as an inspiration to us all." Huckstep responds, "It is truly a privilege to join last year's recipient, Judge Inge Prytz Johnson. I am humbled to accept an award in honor of Nina Miglionico. As 'Miss Nina' once said, Isn't the more important thing the people who follow you? It is great to be first, to be 'one,' but it is the two and three and four that come after you that is the telling thing." Huckstep continues, "My goal has never been to be the first female to achieve a particular accomplishment. My goal has always been to commit myself 100 percent to the task at hand and to accept nothing less than the very best for my clients, my firm, and my community." Huckstep's career has been marked by many impressive achievements. Huckstep is one of the top health care attorneys in the Southeast region. She is the first female to chair the Executive Committee

of her firm, Adams and Reese LLP, one of the fastest growing law firms in the South Central United States. She was also the first female elected to serve on the Executive Committee of Lange, Simpson, Robinson & Somerville, one of Alabama's oldest law firms that merged with Adams and Reese in 2003. In addition to becoming the first female chair, Huckstep was also the first female to chair a top ten law firm in the entire state of Alabama. It was under her leadership that the successful Lange Simpson merger with Adams and Reese took flight. As a top health care attorney, Huckstep has been recognized by "Best Lawyers in America®" for Health Care Law for many years. She represents a number of health care providers, including hospitals, medical service companies and physicians. She serves as an advisor on a broad range of matters, including compliance, accreditation, business transactions and corporate matters. She is well-known for her extensive experience with Certificate of Need Law. In addition to health care law, Huckstep also practices in the areas of employee benefits and ERISA, mergers and acquisitions and general corporate law. Presently, Huckstep serves as a Vice Chairman of the Birmingham Regional Chamber, a member of its Executive Committee, as well as its legal counsel. She is on the Board of Directors of the United Way of Central Alabama, and on the Board of the Birmingham Rotary Club where she serves as Sergeant at Arms. She is also a current Board Member of the Birmingham YMCA. Over the years, Huckstep has received many awards including being named one of only ten "Top Birmingham Women" for 2005 and "Who's Who in Health Care" for 2007 by the Birmingham Business Journal. These honors were bestowed upon her for the many contributions she has made to the legal profession and to the community. The Birmingham Bar Association has over 3000 members, typically publishes a forty page quarterly bulletin, a monthly newsletter, maintains an internet web site, provides for social activities for its members through an entertainment committee and has an established trust fund to aid its needy members, now totaling over \$100,000 dollars. 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### **Gardening for May**

Its about to get buggy, so get ready!

- Pruning – It's still not too late to give roses, evergreens, and shrubs a good pruning, and be sure to prune the early-spring bloomers, including azaleas, when they have finished.
- Spring Bulbs – Cut faded blossoms from tulips and daffodils and allow the foliage to die down naturally. This is important, as they are producing nutrients for next year's blooms.
- New plantings – Trees, shrubs, perennials and roses can be planted and transplanted this month.
- Vegetables and Herbs – May is the month to prepare and plant vegetable and herb gardens. Be sure to check for the last predicted frost date in your area first. Cool season plants, such as onions, lettuce, spinach and most herbs, can be planted earlier. Tomatoes, peppers, melons, and eggplant should be planted after the last predicted frost.
- Weed, weed, weed – Pulling those hateful weeds by hand is still the best way to get rid of them, and by starting early, it's easier to stay ahead of them. Always try to get that rascal out before it has a chance to bloom and go to seed.

What are the options for reading group messages in email? For each group you belong to, you have the option to control both the frequency of email message delivery and the format of messages:

#### Frequency Options

- **Individual Emails**  
Messages are delivered one at a time to your email inbox. This is the best option if you want to keep up on the latest posts immediately. Email attachments, if included in a message and allowed by your moderator, will be sent directly to you.
- **Daily Digest**  
Messages are delivered in batches of 25 or daily, whichever comes sooner. This is the best option if you want to receive fewer mail messages and don't need up-to-the minute posts in your inbox. Email attachments are not available in digests.
- **Only Special Announcements**  
This means you will receive email messages only when the group moderator posts a "Special Announcement" message. This is a good option if you want to pass on day-to-day discussion for very busy groups but do want to receive important updates from the group moderator. Keep in mind that usage by each moderator will vary. (The moderator may choose to never use this feature, in which case you would never receive email messages, or may choose to use it frequently.)
- **No Mail / Web Only**  
The best option to choose if you prefer to only read messages on the web. Also useful if you need to temporarily put message delivery on hold, for example while you are on vacation. However, keep in mind that (while rare) some groups do not enable the "message archive" feature and for these groups it is not possible to read messages on the web. It is a moderator decision on whether to enable the message archive feature.

#### Format Options

- **Full Featured**  
Includes links giving you instant access to all group features (photos, calendar, profiles, polls, files, etc.), the ability to see all messages to a topic, and a "recent activity module" providing information on new activity in the group over the last seven days. Definitely the best choice for groups that use more than just the message features or groups where you want to take advantage of the message archive.
- **Traditional**  
Emails are delivered "as is", without the addition of any links back to the group, except in the footer of the email. The right choice if your email client does not effectively support the "Full Featured" format.

#### Guidelines for posting messages

The Women Lawyers Section wants the list-serve to be an active tool, however it is recognized that too much irrelevant traffic will defeat the purpose of the list-serve. The following are some guidelines to use in posting messages. These guidelines are not intended to scare anyone from posting messages or other valuable information. Rather, experiences with other list-serves suggest that guidelines will keep our list-serve running smoothly and effectively.

The following types of messages are NOT appropriate.

- 1) Marketing by list members or others.
- 2) Political announcements or petitions.
- 3) Political solicitation, including campaign materials.
- 4) Any other message not directly related to or of particular interest to section members . This category includes jokes (even funny ones), warnings about internet scams and viruses and chain messages.
- 5) Any kind of inflammatory, discriminatory or personal attacks.
